


INTRODUCING THE WORLD YMCA
A GLOBAL MOVEMENT COMMITTED TO EMPOWERING YOUNG PEOPLE

In around 12,000 local communities around the world the YMCA works to address issues by developing programmes and activities with a special focus on young people. We do this in order to build a "human community of justice with love, peace and reconciliation for the fullness of life for all creation".

The YMCA movement is organized as a federation of 120 independent national associations linked through the World Alliance of YMCAs which is based in Geneva, Switzerland. The World Alliance provides inspirational leadership, represents the global movement and facilitates cooperation among the national associations in the areas of Youth Empowerment, Movement Strengthening, Resource Mobilisation, Communications/Branding and Constitution and Governance. Together we work with a vast network of related agencies and groups working towards one common goal: Empowering Young People.

YMCA branches all over the world are working with a diverse range of programmes and activities including our 4 global strategic areas - employment, health, civic engagement and environment- all of them, focusing on young people.

The work of our almost 100,000 staff alongside millions of volunteers is reaching 58 million people in all continents of the world. To respond to the world's challenges, the movement is also organized in Area Organizations [Asia and Pacific, Latin America and Caribbean, Europe and Africa] for strategic cooperation, under a Governance Policy Agreement.

OUR WAYSTRATEGY

The global YMCA Movement Strategy is called OUR WAY, reflecting the unity we have for walking together on the long journey. In 2017 we celebrated our 173rd year of serving the world's young people.

OUR WAY Strategy 2014-2018 was unanimously approved during the 18th World Council in 2014.

It has an external focus on Youth Empowerment. Our ambition is to grow the number of young people reached by the YMCA to 90 million, thereby providing them the support they need to succeed in life.

The Strategy also contains an internal focus on Movement Strengthening. By expanding the YMCAs reach and impact we aim to strengthen our movement to empower more young people.

OUR WAY Strategy Elements

Strategic Focus: Youth Empowerment

The World YMCA movement collectively invests resources in young people.

Youth Empowerment is the YMCA's shared focus at all levels. YMCA Change Agents are active young people and the face of the movement through this global leadership development programme for young people aged between 18-30 and coordinated by the World YMCA.

Strategic Priority 1: Resource Development

The World YMCA leverages and expands resources to increase the organisational capacity and sustainability of YMCAs around the world.

Strategic Priority 2: Research, Communications & Advocacy, Impact Assessment


Build capacity, expertise, and a collective YMCA profile of relevance to young people and the critical issues of concern to them: employment, health, civic engagement, and environment.

Internal Strategic Focus: Movement Strengthening

The World YMCA continues to work on Movement Strengthening with the focus on the three pillars of strong YMCAs: Mission Clarity, Social Relevance and Institutional Viability.

WORLD YMCA OUR WAY STRATEGY REPORT

I often share how the YMCA movement has come so far since that moment we untapped the potential of Youth Empowerment because it was here that we found unity. This gave us a common purpose and strength to move ahead in leaps and bounds together.

The OUR WAY Strategy – and the progress made on the next Strategy for 2018-2022 – has built on these ideals and ensured strong growth in all key areas this year. This theme shall be further explored in the new Strategy and also in the 19th World Council whose theme is also labelled "Youth Empowerment 4 Good".

The continued development of this theme and its outworking in YMCA programmes and services in nearly 12,000 local communities ensures we meet our missionary goals.

OUR WAY Strategic Focus: YOUTH EMPOWERMENT

One of the key ways we have propelled our rocket ship of Youth Empowerment has been the continued investment and development of our YMCA Change Agents programme. My joy of travelling the world of YMCA has changed to a higher level when I come across Change Agents almost everywhere.

Since 2013 YMCA Change Agents have created hundreds of new and innovative projects in local YMCAs to help serve local communities. Such innovation at so broad a scale across the world is impressive.

Collectively we have invested in supporting our future leadership and they, in turn, have developed YMCAs to serve greater numbers of young people. They have been ably supported by YMCA mentors who assist each Change Agents and their projects. This is an important development because it is not just leading young people, it is working together, all ages, to ensure the best possible health of YMCAs everywhere. The shape of the most current Cohort shows the strength of our leadership picture:

This year's cohort of Change Agents had regional training in France, Switzerland, Egypt, Japan, USA and Togo. Online training was regularly delivered and Global Gatherings were held in Portugal and Mexico.

Graduated Change Agents are continually followed up for their engagement throughout the year and we always involve them in key World YMCA events, including the OUR WAY Strategy Delivery Summit, resource groups and World Challenge.

The Change Agents were one of the highlights of the 18th World Council and we have ensured that this is a central part of the 19th World Council. Our Change Agents will lead and facilitate many sessions and we shall all learn and grow from this rather unique experience. We hope to have 500 of them in Chiang Mai which will easily make it the largest involvement of young people at a World Council ever. Planning for the next cohort to be ready for 2019-2020 is already underway and will be launched at the World Council.



Innovation Camp

We continue to look to inject new ideas and potential programmes into YMCAs everywhere. The 3rd Innovation Camp, held in September 2017, brought together 55 leaders from 17 countries to discuss innovation through TenSing, Youth Parliament, environmental advocacy and more. Like YMCA Change Agents, this is also Movement Strengthening at its best with 23 countries engaging in additional programme innovation efforts!

Additional efforts were put into POWER SPACE with a view to taking to scale the number of young people reached through innovation programmes. New initiatives in Africa and Romania were great examples of driving impact.

CAMP CLIMATE AT COP23

World YMCA has earnt a popular and positive reputation as the initiator of youth-led advocacy events. Again this year our 'YMCA Camp Climate', held as part of COP 23, was the sell-out venue for more than 180 young people from over 20 youth organisations.


We continue to lead advocacy action for the environment, as a great example of one of our 4 strategic focus areas, through this event and will again be front and centre at COP 24 in Poland 2018.



OUR WAY Strategic Priority 1:RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT

Some highlights of our strategic Resource Development activities includes:

- Our Property Development Project has brought results to local YMCAs who have progressed and improved their property holdings and opportunities. Over 30 projects have been mapped and this has resulted in securing of long term leases for properties, as well as investment proposals.
- Our World YMCA Staff Placement programme has seen professionals from all Area organisations and as far and wide as Nepal, Belarus, Kenya, Australia, Brazil and Mexico. Some are returning to assist with World Council again this year.
- Alternative Tourism programmes continued to develop this year with adventures in Cambodia, Palestine and Sri Lanka. New programmes for 2018 have already been launched, including the Trans-Siberian Railway Experience which has already sold out.
 - A new Children and Youth Safety Policy Paper was approved by the Executive Committee and all World YMCA staff completed Children and Youth Safety Training.



OUR WAY Strategic Priority 2:

RESEARCH, COMMUNICATIONS AND ADVOCACY, IMPACT ASSESSMENT

Experience gained from our first One Million Voices **Research** continues to assist local YMCAs develop strategy as they listen to and hear from their local young people about their most urgent needs. We continue to present OMV results wherever possible including, for example, at the World Council of Churches training programme.

Our second Research programme developed throughout the year and the results will be presented at the 19th World Council. We have worked closely with 20 members by using quantitative techniques to build upon the first Research. Where possible, fundraising is undertaken to support those members who need resources to undertake the research methodology. We also worked closely this year to prepare for future participation in the YMCA-UN Youth Poll.

The very important **YMCA-YWCA Week of Prayer** had a vital theme again this year: "Stand Up, Speak Up – Be the voice of the voiceless". This was another extension from our Research about giving young people a voice.





Our 2017 YMCA World Challenge event celebrated the 125th anniversary of the YMCA invention of basketball. This was an exceptionally popular event as so many YMCAs enjoy using the day to celebrate with their local communities and talk about the impact of the YMCA. We were recognised for our global impact when we were nominated for 'NGO Of The Year' at the International Peace and Sports Award.

The 2018 event was launched with the goal of running the combined distance to every YMCA member in the world alliance. This is our biggest challenge yet!

Our **advocacy** work is continuing to develop as we aim to fulfil OUR WAY's goal of influencing national and global policy debate by increasing the youth agenda. The four advocacy areas of OUR WAY – employment, environment, civic engagement and health – are being realised through global working groups. Position papers on Civic Engagement and Employment were approved by the Executive Committee.

We have continued to actively participate in **International Forums** and policy-making events to highlight the importance of young people's voice and to motivate partnership with youth and youth organisations. OMV results are regularly used to create content for

World YMCA public statements and advocacy actions at those events. Examples include involvement at the World Health Assembly, ECOSOC Youth Forum, International Labor Conference, Mid Sessions on Climate Change and COP 23 and Youth Employment Academy.

Our **social media** footprint continues to grow and we have record number of followers and people interacting with us via Facebook (up by 27% this year), Twitter, Instagram, Flickr and Snap Chat. We are now one of the largest YMCA groups to be found on social media.

Our **partnership** continues to develop with the Harlem Globetrotters, who love basketball as much as we do! We shall see more of this work in 2018. We also developed our partnerships with the Pontifical Council for Promoting Christian Unity at the Vatican.

The important work done as part of our **Global YMCA Refugee Initiative** has seen us use our office in Greece to work across many countries and areas, including Germany, Lebanon and Cameroon. As a result, we were honoured to be recognised with member status as a Partner Organisation for UNHCR and Observer for IOM. We are active, working alongside our expert YMCA resource group, in both emergency activities, as well as ongoing refugee work.

OUR WAY Internal Strategic Focus:MOVEMENT STRENGTHENING

Movement Strengthening remains a priority for the World YMCA. Some highlights of our investments include:



- Financial support to the 4 Area Organisations to provide staff to operate Movement Strengthening activities continued. This financial support has been ongoing in Africa, Asia and Pacific, Europe and LACA now for several years.
- The annual National General Secretaries Meeting. This year we held the 7th
 meeting and had the highest number of attendees ever with over 60 YMCA
 members represented. In 2018 it was held in Switzerland and included a
 memorable visit to the World YMCA headquarters in Geneva; a first for many
 of the NGS. Particular highlights from this meeting including embracing of the
 YMC Safe Space information and an agreement to plan and present at the
 World Council in a joint NGS session.
- A focus on Russian-speaking countries who benefited from ongoing Training the Trainers to extend and expand programmes. Also, the YMCA Russia Support Group continued to meet.
- Work continued on collecting and compiling data for 'The Blue Book' the movement's story of size and programmes.
- Multiple consultations took place for the new 2018-2022 Strategy, "Youth Empowerment 4 Good". This will be recommended for approval by the Executive Committee at the World Council.
- The 3rd OUR WAY Strategy Delivery Summit was held in November, again at the YMCA Europe Training Centre. This year we used the group as a rather large brain storm session to develop future strategies at a faster pace and deeper level. Again it was a memorable event with deep impact for the Strategy.
- The Safe Space Working Group concluded its work and is ready to share its
 report with the movement at the World Council. After an extensive
 consultation process the Executive Committee of the World YMCA embraced
 their Value Statement recommendation and made the Safe Space policy a part
 of the World YMCA.
- Planning for the 19th World Council continues. If early registration is a
 measure, then this will be a great event. At the closure of the Early Bird period
 there was a record 1,200 participants registered, and it promises to be a
 memorable event.

CONCLUSION

OUR WAY Strategy continues to take us deeper into Youth Empowerment and more quickly into greater impact across our 12000 local YMCAs. As I continue to travel across the movement I see this more clearly everywhere I go. I am thankful for those friends and leaders who are committed to seeing this as the cornerstone of our movement for the long term future.

Report of the statutory auditor on the financial statements

As statutory auditor, we have audited the accompanying financial statements of The World Alliance of Young Men's Christian Associations, which comprise the balance sheet, statement of income and expenditure and notes, for the year ended 31 December 2017.

Executive Committee's responsibility

The Executive Committee is responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of Swiss law and the association's articles of incorporation. This responsibility includes designing, implementing and maintaining an internal control system relevant to the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error. The Board is further responsible for selecting and applying appropriate accounting policies and making accounting estimates that are reasonable in the circumstances.

Auditor's responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with Swiss law and Swiss Auditing Standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers the internal control system relevant to the entity's preparation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control system. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Oninion

In our opinion, the financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2017 comply with Swiss law and the association's articles of incorporation.

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Report on other legal requirements

We confirm that we meet the legal requirements on licensing according to the Auditor Oversight Act (AOA) and independence (article 69b paragraph 3 CC in connection with article 728 CO) and that there are no circumstances incompatible with our independence.

In accordance with article 69b paragraph 3 CC in connection with article 728a paragraph 1 item 3 CO and Swiss Auditing Standard 890, we confirm that an internal control system exists which has been designed for the preparation of financial statements according to the instructions of the Association Executive Committee.

We recommend that the financial statements submitted to you be approved.

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
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
